The **Moskva** is the name of the river that runs through Moscow, and **Gorky Park** was the name of an amusement park in Moscow. Scorpions were inspired to write this song on a visit to Moscow in 1989.

"**Wind of Change**" celebrates the political changes in Eastern Europe in the late 1980ies - such as the fall of the Berlin Wall, the increasing freedom in the communist bloc (which would soon lead to the fall of the USSR), and the clearly imminent end of the Cold War. It became a worldwide hit in 1991. In 2005 the viewers of the German television network ZDF chose this song as the song of the century. It is the highest ever selling song in Germany. It is known as the song of German reunification (and fall of communism in Eastern Europe generally), even though it only rose to popularity two years later.
